Dennis Eastin to retire from South Harrison

Dennis Eastin, who has been on the South Harrison faculty for 38 years, submitted a letter of retirement as school superintendent at a special school board meeting on Thursday.

Eastin, a native of Leon, Iowa, started as an English and speech teacher at SHHS after graduating from Iowa State University in Ames and later from Northwest Missouri State University.

Early on he served as an assistant high school

principal and then as the building principal for a total of 18 years.

He guided the school district through several capital improvements in recent years including the construction of the middle school, pavement of driveways and parking lots at the high school and, most recently, upgrades at Memorial Stadium such as a new press box and a video scoreboard which was unveiled last Friday night. He

also had to deal with the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic on school operations.

His wife Amy heads the health information department at Harrison County Community Hospital. Their daughter Emma will graduate in May and plans to attend Northwest Missouri State University.

Sheriff says drug, human trafficking is on the rise

Harrison County Sheriff Trevor Place addressed the growing drug problem and the development of phone and computer scams during a talk to the Bethany Rotary Club on Thursday at the Trullinger senior center.

"We have a huge drug problem," Place told the Rotarians. While there had been a problem with other drugs such as meth in the past, he said, "Fentanyl is taking over the country."

Place was told by a DEA agent that Harrison County's location on Interstate-35 makes it a hub for the transportation of drugs and the transfer of victims of human trafficking.

Citizens may have an opportunity to disrupt these activities. "If you see something that doesn't look right, give us a call," the sheriff said but cautioned the public not to intervene but to dial 911 or 660-425-3199.

The sheriff said many residents have become victims of scams. He said the sheriff's office frequently

The Yo-Froyo frozen yogurt shop has opened its doors to the public on 39th Street after having a soft launch on Tuesday, August 29.

Owner Karen Gonzalez said she wanted to bring something to the community that was family oriented and kid friendly. She noted that there were no frozen yogurt places around the area for kids and that they are also offering a healthier option compared to some of the sweeter treats, with some offerings that are sugar, gluten, and dairy free. The shop also keeps a variety of board games on hand like Uno and Connect 4 for customers to play while they sit in the shop.

The shop has been a work in progress for the last few months, starting in March and wrapping up construction in June. Once the machines were brought in and training was completed, Gonzalez and her two daughters, Abby and Bella, opened for business.

Since starting, the shop has been very busy, with many people from the area offering up a lot of community support. Parents, children, school groups, or even the occasional passerby has stopped in for the experience. The shop offers a variety of flavors that change each week, with plans in the works for seasonal or holiday-themed flavors. Customers can top their frozen yogurt with a variety of toppings available from sprinkles to gummy worms and the final price is determined by the weight of their pick at 62 cents per ounce.

Yo-Froyo is open Monday through Saturday from noon to 8 p.m.. Karen stated that she has a few plans in the future, including making gift cards available for the holiday season.

"I think my favorite thing is watching kids coming in with smiles on their face," Gonzalez explained. "One of my goals was to see the kids happy."

59 Years Ago September 16, 1964

The Bulldogs from Bethany opened the football season with a gratifying 20-0 victory at Gallatin on Friday night.

A total of 42 Bethany Kiwanians and their Queens attended charter night at the newly organized Albany Kiwanis Club.

Mrs. Varner Mayse and girls Gail and Carol drove to Columbia on Monday where the girls entered the university.

Wilbur M. Planck, 93, died Sept 11 in Colorado Springs and services were conducted at the Chapel of Memories. Mr. Planck was head of the First National Bank in Bethany for several years before

moving to Colorado.

Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Geer and Mr. and Mrs. Burl Rice had dinner at the Lakeview Restaurant in honor of the Rice's anniversary.

39 Years Ago September 19, 1984

The Harrison County Museum will be opened this weekend with great pomp and fanfare as part of the Harrison County Historical Society's two-day craft show.

A proposal to allow the city of Bethany to annex land at the northern edge of town could be on the ballot next April, according to city officials.

U.S. Rep. Tom Coleman, accompanied by a member of the British Parliament, was in Bethany Saturday to take part in the opening of the Harrison County Republican campaign headquarters.

South Harrison defeated Stanberry 41-7 in a football game on Friday night. The Bulldog team is quarterbacked by Ted Monachino.

Thirteen riders participated in a bike-a-thon for St. Jude's Hospital Saturday at the Ridgeway School.

Three representatives from the Bethany community, Wayne Hettinger, Keith Halstead and Harold Fitzgerald, attended a video conference on downtown and rural revitalization at Northwest Missouri State University.

19 Years Ago September 22, 2004

Mayor Dick Graner and the Bethany City Council moved quickly to accept George Martz's resignation from the police chief job and approve the appointment of veteran police officer Brian Groom to fill the vacancy since Martz became Harrison County Sheriff.

Despite numerous weather delays, the superstructure of the new private jail is beginning to take shape at the end of Roleke Drive in Bethany; Bridewell LLC plans to have enough space to accommodate 250 prisoners.

Jeff Foster, formerly of Bethany, has graduated from the University of Missouri in St. Louis with a Ph.D. in industrial/organizational psychology. Jeff is the son of Lynn and Lynda Foster of Bethany and the grandson of George and Edythe Everett, also of Bethany.

Reunions held recently were the Cummings family reunion; the Charles and Hattie Cover reunion; the Bethany High School Class of 1941 reunion; the late William Henry and Levina Elizabeth "Lizzie" (Meredith) Baker reunion; and the McFall School reunion was held in Pattonsburg.

Stadium gussied up for Friday night football

Memories must have been flooding through the minds of old Bulldogs sitting in the stands at the South Harrison-Maysville football game on Friday night.

What we saw was a modernized football stadium with bright lights, a new press box and a Jumbotron scoreboard no less.

How things have changed from the past seasons when the lighting system was one of the worst in the conference interfering with the spectators' enjoyment of games and even endangering the athletes lost in the shadows of the field.

In my early career in football, back in the 60s, games were played at the fairgrounds. The grandstands should have been an ideal place to watch the game but unfortunately the seating was too far from the field to get a good look at the games.

And the field was totally inadequate. Games were played after the conclusion of the fair when not all of the debris from the demolition derby had been picked up. There were wooden bleachers and a speakers' stand on the opposite side of the field.

This was the scene of one of the most infamous games in Grand River Conference history. Southwest Harrison, as the school was then called, was hosting the Princeton Tigers when the game got out of hand with the Bulldogs far ahead. There were fights between players and even some spectators.

The Tigers walked off the field at halftime and returned to the dressing room at the high school gymnasium where the fights resumed. The game was never finished.

The Bulldogs held their practices behind the old high school (now the Gym). As I recall, the practice field was short and had patches of fine gravel that ended up embedded in our knees.

I am told that in early years games were played at that location. Ridgeway was once a football powerhouse and had some players go on to play college ball—at least one at Missouri.



Tales from Buck's Branch

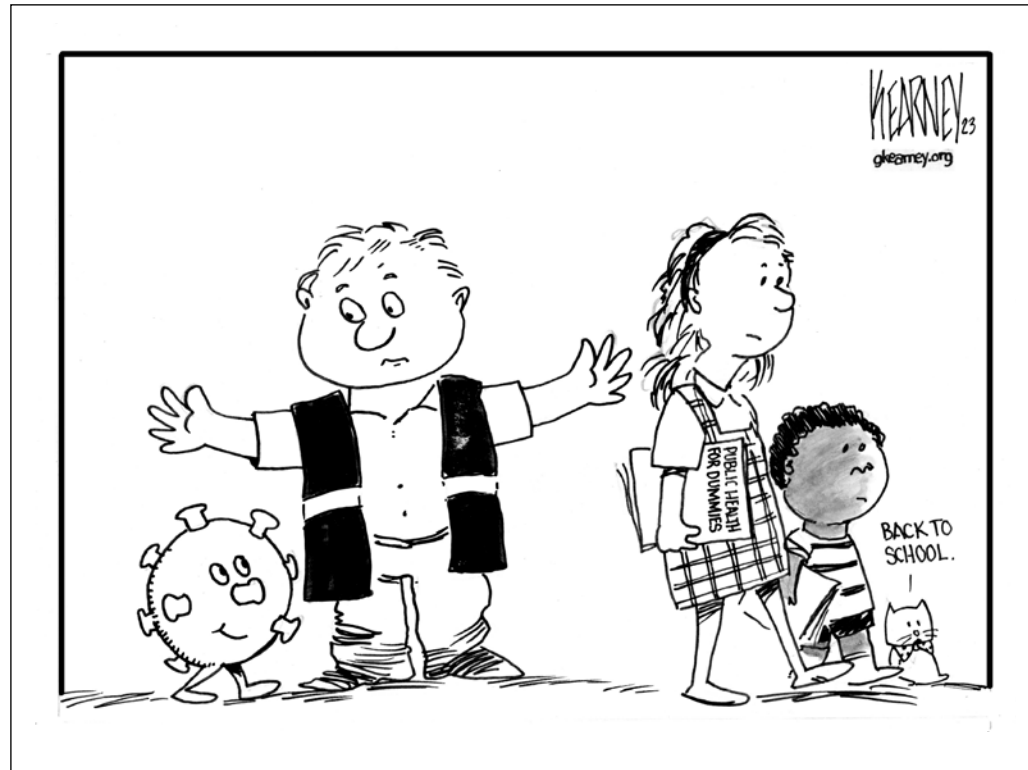

There are few people around who remember when Bethany had a junior college that played football in the 1920's. The games were played behind the old Bethany High School. I came across a photograph of the team with the players wearing the leather helmets of the day looking very imposing. My uncle, Roscoe Guymon, and Florene Miller who went on to become a county commissioner were among the players, among others. The junior college was located in the old west wing of the high school building and lasted only a couple of years. Some of said that the only reason that the junior college was built was to justify building the west addition to the high school.

The present football field was established in the early 1970s by volunteers from the community at the future site of the South Harrison High School. It was a perfect location to watch a football game from a vehicle.

The field later got permanent seats on the east side of the stadium. The next project, perhaps, should be to build permanent seats on the other side of the field to accommodate visiting fans who unfortunately are assigned to wooden bleachers.

With all of this history, it was almost unbelievable to see the changes that have been made in the football stadium over the summer. The only bad thing was the outcome of the game.



School budget increase questioned

Missouri lawmakers greeted a proposed \$300 million increase to the formula that funds the state's public schools with questions Wednesday, with some believing the figure seemed appropriate and others wondering if a change to the state's accountability system drove estimates too high.

The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education unveiled its proposed budget for fiscal year 2025 during the State Board of Education meeting on Tuesday. If lawmakers approve the budget for programs, like literacy coaches, and fully fund the foundation formula, it will bring a \$235 million increase in the education budget.

The department calculated a new state adequacy target, a multiplier in the formula that funds schools. The target is determined by

looking at per-pupil spending of districts scoring above 90% in the Missouri School Improvement Program, an assessment composed of standardized test scores, attendance and other metrics.

The new state adequacy target should be \$7,145, Deputy Education Commissioner Kari Monsees told lawmakers Wednesday, up from \$6,375. The target has been frozen for five years.

This new multiplier will be phased in over two years, leading to a \$120 million increase in general state aid in the first year and \$300 million in year two.

"That's a reasonable amount," Rep. Ed Lewis, R-Moberly, told The Independent, adding that the state adequacy target has been fairly flat for over a decade.

"Now, it's going to jump. It's a significant amount, but it's also a number that's doable,"

Iowa man pleads not guilty to bank robbery

An Iowa man pleaded not guilty to holding up the Interstate Bank in Princeton on May 19 in an appearance before Circuit Judge Steven Hudson in the Mercer County Circuit Court, according to the Princeton Post-Telegraph.

Phillip Michael Blink, 67, of Promise City, has been charged with armed criminal action,

felony stealing or attempting to steal from a financial institution and exhibiting a weapon.

Blink allegedly made away with over \$4,000 in the robbery but was later captured in Knoxville, Iowa.

A plea or trial setting has been scheduled for October 11. He is being held in the Mercer County Jail.

Authorities search for vehicle theft

Missouri and Iowa authorities took part in a manhunt last Wednesday for a man suspected in the theft of a car from a rental lot in Des Moines.

Harrison County Sheriff Trevor Place said the car was traced to Lamoni, Iowa. The driver then fled into northern Harrison County where the

vehicle was abandoned along 125th Street near Hatfield.

The suspect fled into a cornfield but officers were unable to make any arrests. Police dogs and drones were used in the search, and the Iowa State Patrol used an airplane in an attempt to find the suspect who remains at large.

Cool-season vegetables for fall

The recent shift to milder temperatures is a pleasant reminder that it is time for gardeners to plant cool-season vegetables, said University of Missouri Extension horticulture specialist David Trinklein.

Warm days and cool nights make conditions ideal for a second round of cool-season vegetables, Trinklein said. They most often are more flavorful than a spring crop of the same species.

First, pull spent plants and clean debris and weed from the garden. This helps to prevent insects and diseases that tend to be drawn to fall gardens more than spring gardens. Some gardeners use floating row cover to keep insects away, Trinklein says. Row cover is an inexpensive translucent and breathable polyester fabric found at many garden centers.

Next, work the soil lightly and, if needed, add a general-purpose garden fertilizer such as 5-10-5 or 12-12-12 before planting. The need for additional fertilizer depends largely on the vigor of the species previously growing in the space.

Lettuce, beet, kale, collards and some other cool-season vegetables can be planted from seeds. Choose varieties based upon days-to-maturity date. Look for vegetables that can withstand a light frost of about 26 F. Read seed packets for maturity and frost dates. Some greenhouses and garden centers carry started plants of vegetables such as broccoli, cauliflower and kohlrabi.

Keep soils moist until seedlings become established. Scout often for insects and diseases.

Interstate-70 construction to start next year at Columbia

“This time next year,” construction will begin on a 20-mile stretch of Interstate 70 that runs from U.S. 63 in Columbia to Kingdom City.

That’s what Missouri Department of Transportation officials told state lawmakers at a committee hearing Wednesday at the Capitol.

Eric Schroeter, assistant chief

engineer, and Eric Kopinski, Improve I-70 program director, shared the transportation department’s vision for rebuilding 200 miles of interstate highway, which they estimate will take five to seven years.

Construction will be broken up into six projects, the first being the stretch from Columbia to Kingdom City. According to a tentative project schedule posted

online, the sixth project will be a stretch of highway from Marshall to Columbia.

Contracts for each of the six projects will be awarded one at a time. Each project will be approximately 20 to 50 miles long, and the contract values will be between \$300 million and \$600 million, according to the presentation.

ED FUNK AND DALE FOSTER MISTAKEN FOR BANK ROBBERS: During the last weeks of December 1929 the Pattonsburg bank was robbed, and the robbers got away with \$8,000 dollars. The robbers, described as two young men in a Chevrolet sedan, escaped with several hundred armed men in pursuit. The descriptions were sent to all law enforcement agencies. Ed Funk and Dale Foster of New Hampton were on a trip to St. Joseph and between Clarksdale and St. Joseph were pulled over by two St. Joseph policemen. The policemen were sure they had caught the two bank robbers because the description broadcast earlier fit the New Hampton boys to a T. One policeman got in the car with Dale, while Ed was put into the police car. Dale began to start his car but the policeman told him "Just a minute now, I'll tell you when to go." But after being taken back to a service station down the road the boys were able to prove their identity with a bill of sale for Dale's car, and checks both boys had with them, and the boys were "jipped" out of being taken to police headquarters and "telling it to the judge." **The real robbers were caught near Gallatin. Found 02 Jan 1930 in the New Hampton Tribune.

On the other hand, we all know that there are times when it's not necessary to tell the truth, such as games that involve bluffing (that is, lying or otherwise concealing the truth) or in social situations where people often tell white lies rather than transgress important social mores (telling others what you think of their appearance, even when asked, sometimes calls for diplomacy and tact, if not outright dishonesty). But don't we all want to be the kind of person who can be trusted with a secret, or to deliver something of value without pilfering or absconding with it? - Christopher Simon

A BIT OF HISTORY: In the early 1890s, Ridgeway officials would put notices in the Ridgeway Journal to remind residents that this town had ordinances and those ordinances were meant to be followed. For example, in 1891, J.H. Goodwin, "Ch Town Con" (chief town constable, maybe?) printed this reminder: "Did you know it was contrary to the ordinances of the village of Ridgeway to run horses in the corporation? It is all the same, so please do not do it anymore." (Ridgeway Journal, July 10, 1891).

On January 12, 1893, officials printed a reminder in the Journal to remind business owners and residents that anyone who "neglects to clear the sidewalks of snow as aforesaid, for the space of twenty-four hours from the cessation of the following of any snow" could be convicted and fined \$10.

On November 16, 1893, another notice was printed that there was an ordinance prohibiting boys from wandering the streets at night and "we understand the town dads are looking after the matter". The boys were mostly still in school and the writer felt that being on the streets at night meant that the boys were neglecting their schoolwork. The item ended with a warning: "If parents can't keep their children home at night, the town officials can."

South Harrison volleyball team makes comeback win against Trenton

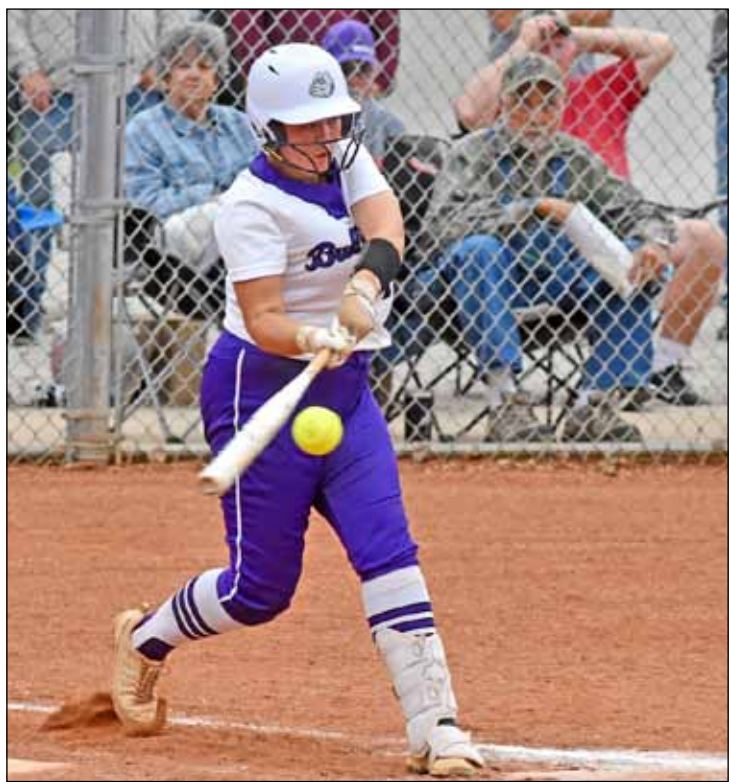

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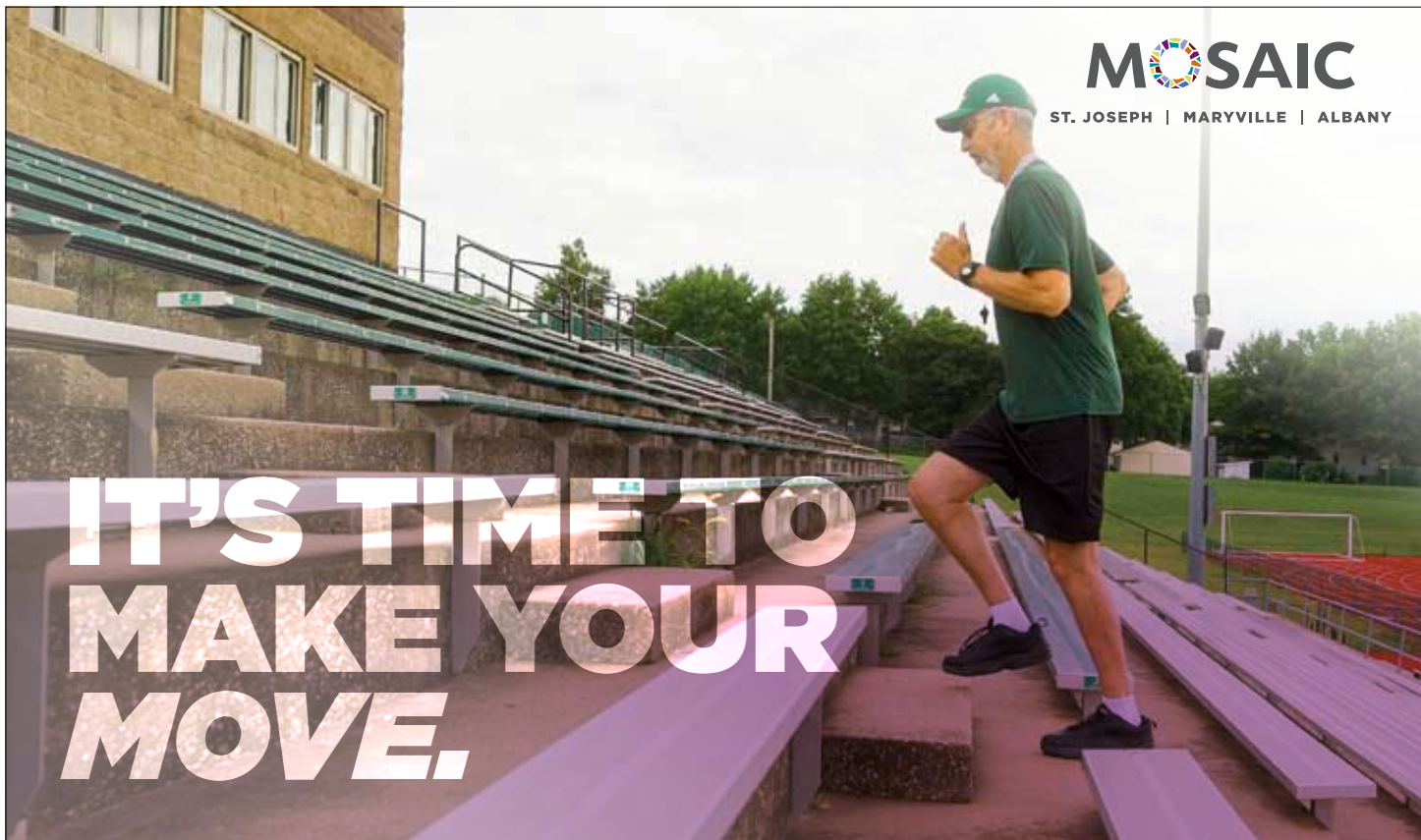

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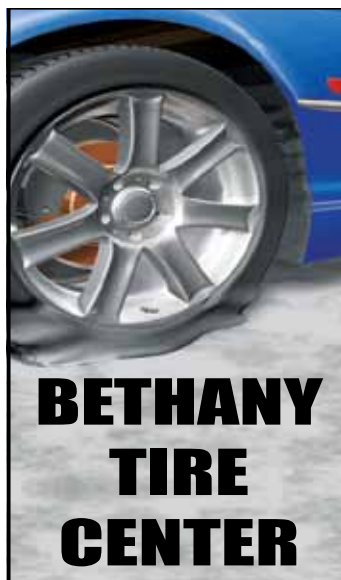

Barge traffic will have big impact on agriculture in Missouri, Kinne says

The expansion of barge traffic on the Missouri River will boost the agricultural economy in Northwest Missouri, Shane Kinne told the Missouri Farm Bureau members Thursday night at the South Harrison Middle School.

Kinne, an Eagleville native and graduate of North Harrison, is executive director of the Coalition to Protect the Missouri River.

Kinne said the opening of a

new port on the upper Missouri at Blenco, Iowa, will increase barge traffic on the Missouri which will facilitate the shipment of corn and soybeans and the delivery of fertilizer to farmers up the river.

"We support the purposes of the Missouri River including flood control, navigation and water supply," Kinne explained.

Kinne said the NEW Cooperative Inc. in Blenco will have an impact on Harrison County. It now operates the grain elevator in Cainsville.

Jeff Gibson, president of the Harrison County Farm Bureau, welcomed the audience to the annual meeting. The meal was prepared by Woods & Main in Eagleville.

The meeting began with the

presentation of colors by American Legion Post 216 and VFW Post 2176.
